Name recognition (If your child knows the letters in their name, do the alphabet, if they know the alphabet try CVC words such as cat, dog, pen etc.).	Letters on a balloon Write the letters randomly on a balloon and where your child catches it ask them to say the letter.	Lego building Write your child's name individually on Lego pieces and ask them to put together in the correct order.	Matching Write the letters individually in bun cases and on bottle lids. Ask your child to match up the letters. 	Find your name Write your child's name and another person's name or more onto paper and ask them to circle all of the ones that say their name.	Writing If your child can write their name - help them to hold their pencil correctly. You can do this by putting a Pom Pom in the palm of their hand when they are holding their pencil. If your child cannot write their name, write it in pencil for them to trace over in felt tip. It does not matter if it is scribbles and not accurate.
Phonics <i>Please see the YouTube channel for videos.</i>	Sort objects beginning with p and i into relevant piles.	Play eye spy to find things that begin with the letter sound i.	Reveal the sounds- hide the sounds s, a, t, p and i in sand or anything you have and ask your child to take out one at a time and say the sound.	Play musical statues when the music stops, flash up the sounds s, a, t, p, i (one at a time) and your child needs to shout it out before carrying on.	Writing the letter sound i.

Activity	Shape hunt Send your child on a 2D shape hunt to discover shapes they can find in the home.	Shape printing Use old toilet rolls to make shape prints with. 	Shape jump Chalk shapes on the floor or draw on paper and ask your child to jump from shape to shape. Ask them to describe the properties of each shape - sides, corners.	Shape pictures Use shapes to make an exciting picture- can your child count how many of each shape they have used. 	Say it, make it, draw it.
