

Extension: Write a sentence, 'If I met the Gruffalo I would'	Addition continued. Video: 1	Stick ten frames Go on a hunt outdoors for some sticks and stones. See if they can challenge themselves to make their own stick ten frame. Challenge: Up to 20 (Collect some other natural materials, you will need them for the rest of the week.)	 Leaf Necklace – You will need: A selection of leaves, strong, small stick, scissors, hole punch Cut a length of strong long enough for a necklace. Tie a small stick to one end of the strong – this will act as the needle. Tie a large knot on the other end. Allow a child to choose leaves for their necklace. You may wish to make threading holes with the hole punch or you may wish for the children to make the holes themselves using the whole punch or a thin stick. Once the leaves have been threaded, cut off or untie the stick and tie the necklace into a loop. Allow the children to wear their creations.

It helps them develop language and listening skills and prepares them to understand the written word. ...
